

Airheads at the Aerodrome, June 21st -23rd

June 21-23 was the 24th Airheads at the Aerodrome rally, held in Wilson County Park in Stan-

fordville, NY. NY Airmarshal Michael Friedle runs this event every year. It's a camping rally, but there's a nice motel/B&B nearby for those of us who don't camp. Often, participants bring things for sale, so there's a small flea market component. Saturday night is the "big dinner", which Michael's wife (and many helpers) cook/assemble/serve.

There are a number of attractions in the area around the rally, chief among them being the Rhinebeck Aerodrome, which is a grass strip runway and an airplane museum. On weekends, if the weather is perfect (clear, no wind) the Aerodrome puts on an airshow, with pre-WWII planes on Saturday and early pioneer airplanes (pre WWI and WWI) on Sundays.



Also local to the rally is the Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential Library, which is at the site of one of his family homes, Hyde Park.



There's also Motorcyclepedia, the motorcycle museum in Newburgh, NY, Wing's castle in Millbrook, NY, and the Walk across the Hudson, near Poughkeepsie, NY.

Ride to Barber and Houston

Last month I covered the first part of our ride from NJ to Fontana MOA Getaway rally. This is where Herb, Richie, Kevin and I rode several loops around the Smokies south of Ashville NC. I won't repeat the 2-hour loop story since Herb is tired of hearing it again. (See the May and June newsletters.) From Fontana, the area near the Dragon, Richie Candrilli and I headed southwest on secondary roads to Chattanooga TN and then interstate 59 to Birmingham AL... Destination: Barber Motorsport Museum.

On the way, we sidetracked to Scottsboro AL to see the Unclaimed Baggage Company, a place that purchased airline and other unclaimed/lost baggage and freight from all over the U.S. www.unclaimedbaggage.com/ Unfortunately it was Sunday and they were closed.

However I did stop on my way back from Houston (on a Monday) and enjoyed looking and buying a few things including an iPhone7. They give most of the clothes to charities and sell the rest after dry-cleaning/laundering. They show all items including laptops, cell phones, other electronics, sun glasses, clothes, etc in neat and organized

displays..all cleaned, electronics tested, all barcode tagged.

We arrived at Barber early enough to do several hours touring thru the vintage bikes and were lucky to gain an extra hour because of time zone change.



This was my third time at Barbers but first since they expanded the building. It was Richie's first encounter. I am still struck by the enormous building, professional display of each bike, vertical columns of bikes as you enter the multi-level museum. The building facilities and bikes are meticulously clean; all bikes are well documented and are displayed on raised pedestals.

Barber Motorsports Park is an 880 acre, multipurpose racing facility located on the eastern fringes of Birmingham, Alabama. It was built by George Barber and includes the Barber Vintage Motorsport Museum, which has been named "World's Largest Motorcycle Museum" by the Guinness World Records. It has a 17-turn, 2.38mile (3.83 km) road course too. The museum boasts over 1400 vintage bikes.

On the following morning after staying overnight at the nearby Hampton Inn (which also had a Barber's vintage bike in the lobby), Richie headed home and I continued toward Houston TX for an MOA board meeting.

From Birmingham I followed I-59 south to I-10 toward New Orleans and Houston. Between New Orleans and Baton Rouge I decided to find a great seafood lunch spot someone at Fontana had told me about. It was a small restaurant in the southern most city in Louisiana.... not New Orleans, but Grand Isle, a city 60 miles due south of New Orleans as the crow flies.



For me, it was closer to 120 miles around and about to get there.... secondary roads, over many bridges, along canals, and finally to the gulf shore town.

The area was fascinating as was the ride. Much like our NJ coastal towns, most houses were raised on pilings; even the movie theater was raised where cars could park underneath. The cat fish and sea food gumbo was good but the 200+ diversion ride was better.



Finishing the ride to Houston was uneventful as was the 1700 mile ride back to NJ. I stayed overnight two times on the way back... Birming-

ham (so I could visit the Unclaimed Baggage Company on a Monday) and Lexington VA just of I-81.

My overall trip from April 2 to May 7th was 3912 miles; no rain, no breakdowns, no added oil, and lubed my F800GSA chain only five times.

Newsletter Articles – a How To

Since we're always encouraging any club member to make a contribution of an article or photos, or both to be published in the newsletter, I thought I'd outline some suggestions on how to submit them

- Email them to ME - not to the NJSBMWR mail-

ing list. Once they go out to the main mailing list there isn't a lot of reason to publish them.

Send articles to me in "plain text" - that means simple text, unformatted – no embedded pictures (send those along as attachments.)

If you're using something like MS-Word, or Libre-Office to create your masterpieces, after you're done proof reading it for correctness, spelling, grammar and all those good things - use EDIT/SelectAll (CTRL/A) and then EDIT/COPY (CTRL/C.)

Next, assuming you're using a WindowsPC – open Notepad (type it in the search windows at the left corner of your screen and it will start) and PASTE (CTRL/V) the text you copied into Notepad.

Then save it as "yourarticletitle.txt" and email it off to me.

This effectively deformats it. The problem with sending files along that are formatted, is if I try to simply enter them into the newsletter with the formatting intact, it messes up my newsletter template and can make a huge mess out of the entire newsletter. When I receive an article in some proprietary format, I have to find a way to open it — then copy and paste it into Notepad before I can copy the deformatted result into the newsletter.

I will do the formatting in the newsletter.

You can add a marker in your text where you'd like a photo to appear, something like

[PHOTO ABCDE, JPG HERE]
and I'll try to place it there, but it's not always possible because photos lock to either a page or a paragraph, and sometimes adding one at a certain location can throw off all the formatting that follows the photo.

Finally – photos. People we know come 1st. Peope we know with bikes comes a close 2nd, Interesting bikes that make a point in a story are a 3rd, random bikes – really not very interesting. Scenic views – as nice as they are – BORING. Sorry..

If you have a windows PC – please go find irfanview – it's a free photo editor that is as good as any paid one. Please use it to crop, then resize your photos so the longest dimension on them is no greater than 800 pixels. Again – if you don't do it – I then have to – I may not always correctly interpret the meaning of the photo and may crop something important out.

PLEASE send everything for the newsletter to me at deilenberger@gmail.com – be nice to have newsletter in the subject line so I can spot it.
